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Dr Alistair Lumb

Dr Alistair Lumb is a consultant in diabetes and acute general medicine at Oxford University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust. He is a member of the ExTOD (exercise in type one diabetes) steering committee and undertakes specialist sports clinics for adults and children with type 1 diabetes. He is also clinical lead for the National Diabetes Inpatient Safety Audit and chair of the Diabetes Technology Network-UK (DTN-UK). His clinical interests also include cystic fibrosis-related diabetes and transplantation.

Dr Shanika Samarasekera

Dr Samarasekera is an RCP regional adviser for the West Midlands and clinical lead for epilepsy at University Hospitals Birmingham NHS Foundation Trust. Shanika graduated and trained in Newcastle and the West Midlands. She has a background in psychiatry and neurology and runs a regional clinical for patients with intellectual disability. She is an advisor for the charity UK-Rare Epilepsies Together (UK-RET).



Professor Sanjay Sharma

Sanjay Sharma is professor of cardiology at St George's, University of London and St George's NHS Foundation trust. His interests include heart muscle disease, sudden cardiac death in the young, and sports cardiology for which he has an international reputation and over 350 publications on PubMed (h index 98). He regularly lectures at major scientific meetings and is now considered as one of the most prolific cardiologists in the world in his field of research. Professor Sharma leads a large tertiary inherited cardiac diseases programme serving South-East England to manage young patients with cardiomyopathy and ion channel diseases. He is the director for the largest sports cardiology unit in the UK which is responsible for athletes with potentially serious cardiac diseases from the English Football Association, rugby league, Lawn Tennis association and the English institute of sport. He is the cardiology advisor for the British rowing team and is the chairman for the expert cardiac committee for the football association. He is medical director of the London marathon and has been commended for providing one of the best medical services for endurance events in the world. He was awarded membership of Venerable Order of St John for his services to St John Ambulance for supporting the medical welfare of the runners. Professor Sharma was the lead cardiologist for the 2012 London Olympics and provided medical services for all endurance sports. Professor Sharma has previously held posts as chairman of the ESC sports cardiology nucleus, board member for the European Association of Cardiovascular Prevention, congress programme committee member of the European Society of Cardiology in Preventive Cardiology, "Best of ESC" expert group, ESC media and communications committee, editor for ESC Congress News and International associate editor for the European Heart Journal. Working with the charitable organisation, Cardiac Risk in the Young (CRY) for the past 25 years, Professor Sharma leads the largest cardiac screening programme in the UK for individuals aged 14-35 years old. The charity screens over 20,000 individuals each year from which several data sets have been developed to provide an estimate of the number of young individuals dying suddenly from unsuspected heart disease and methods to prevent such tragedies.



Dr Richard Baretto

Dr Richard Baretto has researched primary immune deficiencies, including antibody deficiencies and deficiencies of the innate system affecting mycobacteria immunity and pneumococcal infection. His allergy research has been on perioperative anaphylaxis, food and drug allergy.



Professor Sanjay Sisodiya

Professor Sanjay Sisodiya is professor of neurology at UCL institute of neurology and honorary consultant neurologist at the National Hospital for Neurology and Neurosurgery and the Epilepsy Society. His key interests are in epilepsy, difficult-totreat epilepsy, phenotyping in epilepsy and genetic research into epilepsy, and the impacts of climate change on neurological diseases. In 2021, Sanjay was appointed to the posts of deputy director for sustainability and climate change at the UCL Queen Square Institute of Neurology, and chair of the International League Against Epilepsy climate change commission.



Dr Rhea Saksena

Dr Rhea Saksena is a passionate health advocate. She graduated from UCL with first class honours in global health, where she was awarded the John Yudkin prize in International health and nominated for the Faculty of Life Sciences. She has worked as scientific officer for Public Health England, designing and implementing strategies as part of the national childhood obesity strategy. Rhea is one of three people to be jointly awarded both a Fulbright scholarship and Kennedy Memorial Trust scholarship. Through these awards, Rhea has undertaken a Masters in Public Health at the Harvard TH Chan School of Public Health. Rhea is currently training as an NIHR academic clinical fellow in diabetes and endocrinology in Oxford, a role which enables her to continue to develop both her clinical and academic approaches to ensure that a high standard of metabolic health is a certainty for all and not a privilege for the lucky few.



Dr Roopa Chopra

Dr Roopa Chopra is an acting up consultant in diabetes and endocrine, and clinical lead for GIM in New Cross Hospital, Wolverhampton. Roopa came to the UK on an MTI post in 2016 as an international medical graduate (IMG) through the Royal College of Physicians. She was appointed as the first pastoral lead, first chief clinical fellow and then first non-trainee chief registrar in her trust. As an IMG, Roopa faced challenges and struggled in the beginning of her career in the NHS but has been lucky to be working with the Royal Wolverhampton NHS Trust. She was given the opportunity to develop various support services that can improve the transitioning of IMGs into the NHS and has been well supported and encouraged by the clinical fellowship team in this journey.



Dr Joanna Whitehouse

Dr Joanna Whitehouse became a consultant in cystic fibrosis (CF) at the West Midlands adult CF centre in 2004 and took over as centre director in 2011. She leads on non-CF bronchiectasis for HGS, developing services for this group, in particular respiratory patients with primary immunodeficiency and more recently PCD. Joanna has spent 3 years as a member of the BTS specialist advisory group for CF and has been a member of the national CF trust strategic implementation board since 2016. She leads on clinical trials in CF and is a member of the national and European clinical trial networks for CF. For the past 3 years she has taken over as chair of the Heartlands cystic fibrosis centre charity. Her interests are palliative care and obstetrics for CF patients.



Dr Rayessa Rayessa

Dr Rayessa Rayessa trained as a geriatrician in North East London followed by a stroke fellowship in Edinburgh. She was one of the first trainees to benefit from the dedicated specialist stroke training culminating in a CCST in stroke. Rayessa has been a stroke consultant at Hull University Teaching Hospitals for the past 14 years and has held various leadership positions, including clinical lead and research lead for the service and latterly the clinical lead for the ISDN in HNY. Her passions lie in service development and improvement, including pathway transformations (operationally) and cerebral amyloid angiopathy and AF management (clinically). She has also completed a LLM in medical law and ethics from University of Edinburgh and an executive MBA from Hull University.



Dr Rebecca Harris

Dr Harris graduated from the University of Nottingham and completed her postgraduate training in general internal medicine, gastroenterology and hepatology across the East Midlands. Dr Harris received a PhD from the University of Nottingham in 2019, which focussed on the early identification and stratification of patients at risk of chronic liver disease. She has assisted in translating this research into clinical practice across Nottinghamshire.
